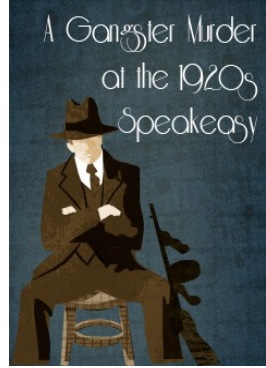

Fanny Birchwood

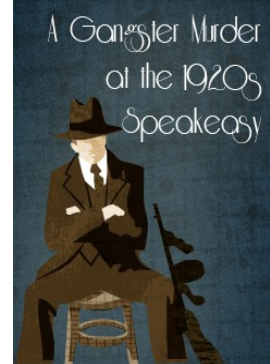
